"Blithe Spirit" is the third production presented by the Fort Smith Little Theatre, Inc. Every person who purchases a season ticket for these performances is automatically a member of the Little Theatre, and is entitled to attend the annual open meeting in May.

The routine business of the organization is conducted by an executive board of fifteen members, five of whom are elected yearly from the membership at large to serve a term of three years.

These productions are brought to you under the sponsorship of the Young Ladies Guild of Sparks Hospital. The Fort Smith Little Theatre is, in itself, a corporation and it is filling for this community a long felt need for good theatre.

Invaluable, too, are the services rendered to Fort Smith by the Guild. This group buys equipment for the operating rooms at Sparks Hospital and in return the hospital donates an equivalent amount in charity work. Each year, to raise money for this project, the Guild has sponsored some worthwhile entertainment for you of this community. They have presented such fine shows as their Sparks Follies, Colleen Moore's Doll House, and Miss Marjorie Lawrence.

Last year, the Guild decided to sponsor a Little Theatre. Taking the usual financial risks in any new, untried business venture, they began the organization with the presentation of "Mr. and Mrs. North." As you recall, this was a tremendous success. It was even more an artistic than a financial success, but the Guild realized that even though its annual income was less, it was of great benefit to bring living theatre to Fort Smith.

The net proceeds of the three productions for this year, 1948-49, are divided equally between the two organizations. The responsibility of each group is specific. Little Theatre produces the play and the Guild handles every other phase of operation, including such details as the selling of tickets and publicity.

Everyone connected with Little Theatre and the Guild donates his or her time—from the sound man to the business manager and the director. We hope you feel our productions are more than worth the work and effort expended for each play. We know you will enjoy "Blithe Spirit."

During the war and recently she has been a popular entertainer at Camp Chaffee, performing for boys on bivouac, in the Station Hospital, and in Service Club shows. Reba has taken part locally in the plays "George Washington Slept Here," "Arsenic and Old Lace" and "Incognito." She has appeared in such variety shows as the March of Dimes Benefit and the Sparks Follies.
