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
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

Backstage in the Fort Smith Little Theatre (or) Twenty Thousand Leagues Under the Sea(ts)

With only enthusiasm and nerve and a small amount of training and experience a few ambitious souls reported in response to a newspaper article telling of a plan to start a Little Theatre group in Fort Smith nearly two years ago. The growth of this crew has truly kept pace with the increasing scope of the rest of the Theatre.

Although they're rarely seen by the audience (except at a second curtain call or occasionally by accident), if a show proceeds without breaking down in the middle, the actors and actresses appear with the correct hand props, the stage is set, decorated, lit, and tastefully arranged, makeup is on straight and in character, prompting is swiftly done where needed, the curtain is opened and closed on time, you may be sure that there are those backstage who are responsible.

The first production presented the greatest problem for the crew. The Theatre, of course, had no scenery, no lighting equipment, no makeup, no sound—no money. Heads were scratched, meetings were held, ideas were discussed. Should we build scenery or should we try it in the modern manner with only a suggestion of a set? Then came the thought that there were some old flats, long in disuse, at the Senior High School. A committee went out to examine them and reported that they were in terrible shape. They needed painting and were warped to such an extent that they could not be fitted together. A quick decision was reached to try them anyway. There followed frantic planing, hammering, sawing and painting, and a set was found. It wasn't a good set, but usable under the circumstances. Platforms were needed—and built. Junior High School owned two baby spotlights and two clusters which were pressed into use. This was the beginning.

Each production has presented new problems in set decoration, lighting, makeup, properties and the other behind-the-scenes techniques. With the new problems appeared new faces, volunteers with and without prior experience, among the few whose names you will have seen on program after program. Every issue was met and conquered. You, our patrons, are the judges of the results.
