DIRECTING FOR LITTLE THEATRE

While Mrs. James Pattee was directing for Little Theatre, it was her often expressed wish that the Board appoint a Directing Staff to encourage the development of other directors so that we might have a trained reserve. Such a committee is now permanent on the Board, with the responsibility of securing directors for our productions.

In 1949, Mrs. Burley Johnston, Jr., directed KIND LADY. After the Pattees' departure, Mrs. Payne Morrow directed AFFAIRS OF STATE, December, 1952. In February this year, Miss Margaret Montague gave her professional services to the direction of A BILL OF DIVORCEMENT.

Tonight our director is Miss Ann Sims, whose actual theatrical training has come directly from her work onstage and backstage with Fort Smith Little Theatre. We're proud of her—and proud of us!

Our next production, scheduled for October 12, will be directed by Mrs. Johnston.
