About this play...

When the Pulitzer Prize-winning play, OUR TOWN, was first produced on Broadway, it became an almost instantaneous popular and critical success. In the years since, it has received more productions—both professional and amateur—and has been seen by more people than perhaps any other play in the history of American Theatre.

One of the reasons for the play's popularity is that it concerns familiar people involved in familiar situations. With an unerring pen Thornton Wilder has drawn characters in whom we can often recognize ourselves. OUR TOWN is, in fact, **our** town.

But perhaps the most memorable feature of the play is its method of production.

Much of the scenery and many of the properties handled by the characters exist only in the minds of the playwright and the actors. It is their job to convey to you that the stove they fuel, the grass under their feet, the houses in which they live all are real—not mere figments of another's imagination, but realities seen by you through your mind's eye.

In a very concrete sense you are the set designer, stage crew, and prop man all rolled into one. The only limitations you need observe are those of your own imagination.

Who's A-Round

In the course of the play, RUDY MORGAN (Stage Manager) also plays the parts of Milkman Howie Newsome, Undertaker Joe Stoddard, and Constable Warren. Col. Morgan is once again displaying the versatile talents he has so generously contributed to Little Theatre during the past three seasons. He played the crochety spirit in LO AND BEHOLD! and the befuddled M. Ducotel in MY THREE ANGELS. He was sound technician for HOLIDAY and producer for NIGHT MUST FALL.

MRS. MORGAN (Mrs. Gibbs) will trod the boards for the first time in this production, but she has been a paragon backstage in many capacities. Jessie began by watching, did a few odd jobs, and soon found herself happily "up to her ears." The Morgans make another husband-and-wife team who find L.T. interesting and stimulating.

ROBERT JERKINS (Dr. Gibbs) is one of several men in the cast who are presently stationed at Camp Chaffee. Little Theatre feels fortunate to be able to present new faces and talents to its audience, and we hope in some measure to make these men feel "at home" in the community. Robert received his B.A. at O.U. He played the frustrated Hubert in NIGHT MUST FALL and participated in our SRO play-reading of ON BORROWED TIME.

Well known to Fort Smith audiences for her lovely singing voice, POLLY LOWREY (Mrs. Webb) has performed for us many of the multitudinous chores which are necessary to get a show onstage. Her previous acting stint was as Charlotte in our lilting SKY-LARK. The Lowreys love for dogs is proverbial—Polly will even trim your poodle!

Now with the hospital detachment at Chaffee, MERLIN HOWZE (George) hails from Louisiana. He plans eventually to teach English, plays the piano for recreation. Merlin has previously appeared in a college production of OUR TOWN. He also remembers I REMEMBER MAMA.

Three young people are currently appearing on our stage: REGINA BISHOP (Rebecca), JACQUE GALLAHER (Emily), and SCOTT STUART (Wally). Regina attends St. Boniface, Jacque goes to senior high, and Scott is at Darby junior high. It is a pleasure to present these youngsters who join the growing group of boys and girls who go on to other school and college productions and will someday, we hope, return to us. We know they have found a rewarding avocation or perhaps, here and there, a vocation!

JOHN CRUMP (Professor Willard) teaches T.I.E. at Chaffee. (If you don't know, ask him!) He's a Texan from an army family, but broke tradition to major in English and Education at Baylor, where he did theatricals for fun. He came looking for a back-stage job but we propelled him onstage in two roles. He also plays "Sam Craig."

ROBERT PATRICK (Simon) is an O.U. drama major who has completed two years toward his degree. Painting is his hobby, acting his intended profession. He has already established his reputation on the Oklahoma campus with performances in THE MAD WOMAN of CHAILLOT, ROMEO AND JULIET, NIGHT MUST FALL, and ANTIGONE.

JERRY GRIFFITH (Mr. Webb) was content to begin, for us, in a minor role as the butler in HOLIDAY. But immediately thereafter he zoomed to fame with an unforgettable performance as the psychopathic Dan in NIGHT MUST FALL. He was so convincing we worried a bit that he was planning to marry a sweet young thing. But he carried it off, got back to normal, carried her off, and brought her back to act with him in this play. NANCY GRIFFITH plays Mrs. Soames. After six more months in the army, the Griffiths will return to Illinois where Jerry plans to teach speech therapy.
