NOTES ABOUT THE PLAY

The Skin of Our Teeth was first presented in New Haven, Connecticut, on October 15, 1942. In the original cast were Tallulah Bankhead, Frederic March, Florence Eldridge, Florence Reed, and Montgomery Clift. Thornton Wilder, the author, won the Pulitzer Prize for the writing of this play. Wilder is also remembered for his play Our Town, another Pulitzer Prize Winner.

The Skin of Our Teeth was written as a war play. However, it is more timely today as it was in 1942. Mr. Wilder chose as his theme the ability of the human race to conquer the spirits of Americans as the United States entered World War II. Rather than present his thesis as Mr. Wilder, instead, wrote the play as a comedy, gently poking fun at race, historians, the theatre, and anything else which attracted him.

This play was not an immediate success even though it won the Pulitzer Prize. Audiences became too embittered by Mr. Wilder's unorthodox and staging of the play to take time to listen to what the play had to say. However, anyone familiar with Our Town will know that that is not the case. Despite the critical reception, the play received in the beginning, it was given a very successful New York run. The Department of State selected the comedy for presentation in Europe next year.
