From the Director

Thank you for coming—it is because of you, the audience, that theatre has remained a part of every civilization since the days of Greece, long, long ago. The Bard said "The play's the thing" and this hard-working cast and crew is here for you. We hope you enjoy the play.

The Royal Family is essentially a love-letter to, and satire of, life in the theater. Its titular family, the Cavendishes, seems to be a thinly veiled parody of the (at the time) all-powerful Barrymore clan, although the authors always denied this. The play centers on artists so caught up in their insular worlds that their behavior appears self-centered to those on the outside; but, for the Cavendishes, the show must, indeed, go on.

The Royal Family offers engaging humor, yet works best (perhaps paradoxically) as we observe a family struggling with the sacrifices lying at the heart of a lifetime commitment to acting. And, dear audience, as you witness a surprising turn at the very end, you are left with a question in the air: Is it the family or what the family does that holds the secret of successful life?

Great cast, lively crew, come together to do this for you. You are going to watch the Cavendish family squabble, strut and swoon through one domestic crisis after another.
