

author's note

After we presented A Place to Go at the Fort Smith Little Theatre last year, I decided that I wanted to write more plays. I tried to be true to life in regard to how everyone is portrayed in the play, so this means I'm revealing secrets and putting myself and some of the most important people in my life into a rather vulnerable position. I've been asked several questions during the rehearsals—Did sho really do that? Did you really act like that? Would be really say that? Did your parents know? Usually, the answer to these questions was yes...not a whole lot of this one was made up. Basically, this means, my parents deserve big hugs after the show.

Should we all be embarrassed? Probably. I know that I'm not proud of all of the decisions of my past. But, these decisions helped me to realize who and what were important to me, and this one hard year of my life ledzme solidly to the only true comfort I've ever known...no, not Oreos. the Word of God.
