Well, we both like makeup, and I have on occasion read *The Enquirer* while standing in line at the grocery store. I have not, however, applied makeup at funerals, and I do speak more than one word at a time.
- Jim Moody/Reverend Hooker—WE both love Mexican food. We both love the sound of MY voice. I think I am a more original thinker than he is. He doesn't like to listen to other people's troubles; I do because where else would the really good gossip orginate.
- Nancy Moon/Veda—How Nancy Moon is different from her character, Veda: Nancy makes a terrible helpmeet. How Nancy Moon is similar to her character: We both KNOW we're just so lucky to have him!
- Megan Henley/Nadine When I first asked myself how Nadine and I are alike, all I could think of is that we both seem to like children. Then, I realized Nadine has something in common with many girls and women; she is eager to fall in love. Her problem is she tries to skip straight to the fairy tale ending. Unfortunately, all of her potential Prince Charmings have turned out to be frogs and have left her with many a tadpole. Of course, we've all kissed our share of warty lips.... Nadine has simply cornered the market on it.
- Scott Bly/Clyde—Clyde is a consummate good ole boy. Like Clyde, I take my friendships very seriously, and will do everything I can to come to their aid and be there in time of need. However, unlike Clyde, I know nothing about auto repair and I abhor dipping.
- Nancy Blochberger/Juanita—Like Juanita, I believe a good stick of gum can calm the soul. Unlike my character, I have never been a Yam Queen, worn a tiara or ridden on a float. I'm saving that for my next life.
