Catherine has never known what it is to be loved, and the one time she defines it for herself, it is overshadowed by the deeds of others. Only she can decipher the truth. Her final decision (be it right or wrong) is based on her hardened experience and inner strength. *The Heiress* is sure to please some, unsettle others, and provoke discussion with the remaining.

I was equally fortunate in the set design, dressing, and construction. Lindy Cotner is a dynamic resource of vision. Rob Ledbetter constructed the Sloper home. I am as changing as the themes of this story, and they have kept up with my wishes. The wardrobe team of Kay, Phanita, and Wilma are legend around here, and I'm so glad they consented to work with me. Art Corey is nothing less than the consummate professional.

My dad once told me that directing is to acting like apples are to oranges. I have found this artery of expression to be just that, and I am eternally grateful to my producers, my wardrobe team, my backstage heroes, my cast and crew for making this experience on I'll always cherish.

CAST BIOS

Nikki (Catherine) — After a quarter of a century in theatre, I'm thrilled to be in the world of hoop skirts and corsets! Thanks to Leslie for this fabulous role, my mom for endless free babysitting, and sweet Chloe, who will be outshining me very soon.

Kurt (**Morris**) — After a few plays at UA Fort Smith, I thought I should try FSLT. I hope to continue my experience here. Lend me your daughters.

Ray (Dr. Sloper) — One night almost exactly 25 years ago, I followed my cousin Don into a house in the Belle Grove Historic District to help him carry out a radiator he had purchased there. This house was being used as a rehearsal space for a melodrama planned for that year's Old Fort River Festival. The director was still short one important character - the villain. She was so desperate to fill this role that as my cousin and I walked through the hallway, she blurted out, "Would one of you like to be in a play?" My taciturn cousin immediately said "no." Ordinarily, I would have declined, too. Potential stage fright would have paralyzed me. But for some combination of reasons - one of which, no doubt, was the false bravado that comes from what politicians now call youthful indiscretions - I said 'yes' to her question that night. When I left that house two hours later, I was no longer a mere radiator-carrier; I was

something much nobler; I was an actor! That serendipitous decision completely changed my life. In the intervening years, I've had the thrill to play marvelous characters like Stanley Kowalski, Cyrano, Hildy Johnson, Pseudolus, Big Daddy - and now the brooding Austin Sloper. Community theater, and FSLT in particular, has been a source of my greatest delight. I will always be grateful for the opportunities it has given me, and hope that those opportunities will always be there for everyone who - like me - shares a passion for theater that they might not yet even realize they have. One final note: my cousin Don's first child was born within a month of the radiator raid. As she grew up, it was obvious very early that she loved being on stage. She is appearing in this very production, playing Marian Almond. So it is, that my second cousin Siobhan Kremers and I are sharing 25th birthdays as we appear on stage together during "The Heiress" - her 25th on earth, and my 25th at FSLT. I think that's kind of sweet. Don't you?

Nancy (Aunt Lavinia) - FSLT has been tremendously important to me at different times in my life. Back in high school, I felt like I was born here (or rather, on North O at the old FSLT). Since then, I have returned every few years and each time felt "reborn." I spent a decade In the professional theatre, but have always known that my purest, best theatre experiences have been right here at good old FSLT - one of the main reasons (IMHO) that "life's worth living in Fort Smith!"

Ginny (**Mrs. Almond**) - New to Fort Smith but not to the stage, I have experienced acting, directing and producing. My first role at FSLT was Mrs. Shaw in *Stage Door*. Previously, I have appeared in numerous professional productions, mostly in Houston and Connecticut, including major roles in *Into the Woods*, *Six Degrees of Separation*, *Working*, *Serious Money*, *Jaques Brel*, and lots of vintage musicals. I am delighted to be included - and having a wonderful time - as a member of the cast in *The Heiress*.
