Others on the male side of Emma's efforts are Mr. Knightly (Terry Dilley), a family friend; Mr. Elton (Nathan Stockemer), an attractive young clergyman; Frank Churchill (Dalton Jones), Mr. Weston's son; and Robert Martin (Blake Robertson), a young and worthwhile farmer.
