The perennial comedy favorite *Arsenic and Old Lace* will usher in fall with spooky fun at the Fort Smith Little Theatre. Written by Joseph Kesselring, the play runs September 21 through 30. Director Brandon Bolin promises "to introduce this classic to the 'next generation,' or at the very least, to reacquaint people to it who may have seen it in the past."

The 1941 script debuted on Broadway starring acclaimed character actresses Josephine Hull and Jean Adair as a pair of sweet, elderly Brooklyn sisters who have a disturbing hobby – poisoning lonely old men and burying them in the cellar. Legendary horror film actor Boris Karloff starred as their menacing nephew Jonathan Brewster. The 1944 Frank Capra film starred Cary Grant, Raymond Massey, Peter Lorre, and Hull and Adair who reprised their Broadway roles. The show has been an FSLT favorite with previous productions in 1956, 1983, and 2005.

The characters include New York dramatic critic Mortimer Brewster (Rham Cunningham) who frequently visits his aunts, Miss Abby (Barbara Richardson) and Miss Martha (Micki Voelkel), in their Brooklyn mansion. He is courting Elaine (Carol Sikes), the minister's

daughter, who lives next door. Mortimer's troubles begin when he discovers a body in the window seat of his aunts' house and learns that the women aren't simply aware of the dead man – they actually killed him!

Mortimer's plans are further disrupted by the unexpected return of his vicious criminal brother Jonathan (Charles Belt) and his sidekick, drunken plastic surgeon Dr. Herman Einstein (Steven Howard). Amidst the craziness is Mortimer's other brother Teddy (Brad Nance) who, believing he is President Theodore Roosevelt, is happily occupied blowing his bugle, writing presidential proclamations, and digging locks for the Panama Canal in the cellar. Add in friendly Officers Brophy and Klein (Kurt Marine and Megan Henley), aspiring playwright Officer O'Hara (Malcum Nobles) and irritable Lieutenant Rooney (Steve Dwiggins), and the show bubbles over with fun and physical comedy. The cast is rounded out by a trio of older gentlemen - Elaine's father Dr. Harper (Duff Taylor), potential lodger Mr. Gibbs (Gary Cameron), and sanitarium superintendent Dr. Witherspoon (Jon Gustafson) who may or may not be potential victims of the Brewster sisters.

The talented cast is complemented by an equally able crew. Brandon Bolin is the director with Tina Dale serving as producer. Jamie Lambdin-Bolin is assistant director, Audra Sargent is stage manager, Sharla Cameron is props mistress, and Lynne Gustafson and Sandy McPherson are responsible for costumes. Set design is by Gary Cameron and Hayden Bolin, lighting design is by Gray Ashton, and sound design is by Brandon Bolin.

Having performed in FSLT's 2005 production of *Arsenic*, Rham Cunningham is now having fun creating a different character in this year's show. "Eighteen years ago

I played Teddy who was a little cuckoo, and that role certainly fit me at the time!

Mortimer, who I play now, is attempting to stay sane, but he's having trouble controlling things that are out of his control. I can certainly relate!"

Barbara Richardson who plays Miss Abby is delighted to return to center stage: "The best thing about being back at FSLT is getting to work with the wonderful people here. It's a great experience that I wish you all could share. And to answer everyone's question – no, I never imagined I'd ever play a murderer!"

Brad Nance says, "I think the audience will enjoy my character Teddy because sometimes we all need a little break from reality. It's a relief to whoop and holler and charge about willy-nilly. We all have a little Teddy inside; the trick is to let him out when no one can see – like singing in the shower or arguing with our boss when we're all alone. And this is why actors and patrons alike enjoy theatre. It's a much needed escape that keeps us all from screaming 'Charge!' and running off for parts unknown."

Playing Mortimer's villainous brother Jonathan is a treat for veteran actor Charles Belt: "It can be difficult to be this big of a jerk night after night, but I'd be lying if I said it also wasn't really fun."

Flex Pass patrons can begin seat selection at 7 a.m. September 9. Tickets go on sale to the general public on Thursday, September 14. Opening Night (September 21) tickets are \$20. All other performances are \$12. Performances are at 7:30 p.m. September 21-23 and 27-30. A Sunday matinee is scheduled at 2 p.m. Sunday September 24.
